The couple also attended several events over the course of the weekend to incorporate the Miami community, the university, and their charity into the release of his latest motion picture, "The Gridiron Gang." The University of Miami Alumni Association hosted the Miami premiere of the film at AMC Sunset Place. University of Miami president, Donna Shalala, as well as other notable UM figures attended this red carpet affair.

Senior Emily Sandhaus attended the festivities at The Shops at Sunset Place. She said, "I was very impressed when he came out and talked beforehand and his wife also is an alumni and she seems to be a very successful entrepreneur in the area and they just donated a lot of money, so I am very proud to have someone famous and well-known and willing to give back to UM."

Following the screening, the Johnson's hosted a reception for The Rock Foundation to help underprivileged youth. Attendees filled a pick-up truck with toys to donate to the cause. Senior Alyse Kathryn Jensen represented a local public relations firm at this event to help facilitate the collection of the gifts. She said, "GM is sponsoring the event and they're also donating... to local charities."

The Johnson family visited campus that Saturday






Bill Cosford Cinema. The Rock also conducted a question and answer session with students prior to the showing of the movie.

Regarding the Johnson's outreach towards the UM community, Shalala said, "I'm delighted for the students. They're such good role models; went out, were successful in their professions and then gave back to the university and to their communities."

Blyth Daylong, Director of Scheduling Events and Production for the School of Communication, assisted in executing the on-campus screening. He said, "Basically, my understanding is the Rock has come back to campus with every movie he's done. He and his wife...put this together through the alumni office and that is how it all came about."

In response to distinguished alumni returning to campus, Daylong understands that "not everyone who goes through school is going to be the Rock or anything similar to that, but it is a good reminder to help you get through it a little bit. It's good to give you some ideas and some options that you haven't thought of before. A lot of alumni that come in and talk have taken kind of a weird path to get where they are and aren't taking a path they had anticipated."

While filming the movie, the Rock learned how important it is to be a good coach. He said, "The two main elements that I took out of the movie is, number one, to be a great coach you got to be a great parent to those kids. They're the kids that are coming out of high school and coming into college. And not only that, you got to be a great motivator. And that's not

easy to motivate kids. And now I look back and I can appreciate the coaches who I played under."

Shalala extracted a similar lesson from the movie that she instills in the student body at UM on a daily basis. She said that it is important, "That you never give up; that you do provide opportunity; that all of us aren't perfect. And when you get knocked down, you pick yourself up and you brush yourself off and you have teachers that believe in you and that's, I think, a very good message for every university."

Dany Johnson is now a member of the Board of Trustees as the alumni member and is going

She said that she and her husband decided to donate to the alumni association because "that relationship is just so important to the growth of the university." Shalala said she's "thrilled with the fact that the Rock and Dany are back in the bold and involved in the university."
